

ESTABLISHMENT OF HOLLY GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

THE HISTORY OF HOLLY GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

Some time shortly after 1875, near where the Holly Grove Church now stands, was a heavily wooded area covered with virgin timber such as pine, oak, gum, hickory and holly trees.

The community had no free public school. Mrs. Nancy Castellaw gave one acre of her land for this purpose. The men went into the woods, cut the timber, hewed the logs and built a one-room log school building in a cluster of holly trees. When the new school began, the teacher and the children named the new school "Holly Grove."

During those years and many years after, the only means of transportation was by walking, horse back or wagon. There were very few buggies in the community in those days. The Baptists who lived in the community at that time were members of the Zion Baptist Church. There was only a wagon road from Holly Grove to the Zion Church, and the distance between caused the Baptists living at Holly Grove to consider establishing a church in their community.

After meeting with the church at Zion and relaying their decision to the pastor and the deacons, a business meeting was held and the church acted on their request. Thirty-eight members who lived in Holly Grove would be leaving Zion to form the new church.

The following is minutes of the meeting at Zion Baptist Church, dated September 27, 1885...

The church worshipping at Zion met in a called meeting on the fourth Sunday of September. Following preaching by our pastor, we sat in conference. The floor of the church was opened for the reception. Bro. Moses Lockard came forward and was received into the Christian fellowship of the church after being baptized. The committee to procure lumber and build the stand made a report and the report was received. Bro. J.F. (Jeremiah Fletcher) Castellaw and W.T. Morris were appointed as a standing committee to make collection for the purpose of paying for the stand. Bro. Morris asked the church to relieve the committee on repairing the cemetery, which was granted.

Bro. J.A. (John Ambrose) Thomas presented a list of names of the members of the church petitioning letters of dismissal for the purpose of organizing a church at Holly Grove, where upon, Bro. J. (Joshua) Jones, in order to save the clerk from writing so many letters, moved that the names of the brethren and sisters who would be going into the organization of the church at Holly Grove be dropped from our roll book and the following brethren and sisters went into the organization. Adjourn.

Another list included J.W. Baker, E.M. Jones and Fannie Stanfield. We conclude that they became a part of Holly Grove Baptist Church some time later.

The following is information from the deeds:

In 1886, D.H. Watridge gave a plot of land for a church building. This can be found at the Haywood County courthouse in Brownsville, TN, in Deed Book No. 11, pages 45-46, dated July 23, 1886. We have in our possession a copy of the said deed. Following is a portion of that deed.

D.H. Watridge Deeded to J.B. Booth and J.W. Castellaw Deacons of the Baptist Church Filed July 23, 1886 at 9:00 a.m.

Know all men that whereas the congregation of people in the Civil District No. 5 of Haywood County, state of Tennessee, known as the Baptist Church desire to build a house of worship for the furtherance of the cause of Christ and the teaching of the principles of religion as taught by Missionary Baptists.

I, D.H. Watridge, of the county of Haywood and state of Tennessee, have this day given, granted and bargained and conveyed unto J.W. Castellaw and J.B. Booth as Deacons of the Baptist Church and in trust for the use and benefit of the congregation known as Baptist worshipping there and their successors in office, a certain tract or parcel of land lying and situated in District No. 5 in Haywood County and state of Tennessee. In witness whereof, I have hereto signed my name on this 23rd day of July, 1886.

D.H. Watridge John Haywood, County Clerk and John Clinton Jr., Dept. Clerk

William Watridge (born 1798, died 1864) and Mildred Thompson Watridge were the parents of Dorsey H., Daniel, James Finus, William, and Mary. Dorsey H. (born 1840, died 1890) married Mary E. ?? in 1866. We believe the initial "H" stood for Haywood, because Dorsey H. had a grandson named Haywood. Dorsey and Mary had seven children. Their son Dorsey Thomas married Ida Marie Cobb. They were the parents of a daughter, Effie, who married Chester A. White, and son, Haywood, who married Edna Haynes. Dorsey and Mary's other children were: Eller, who married Ola White; Benard who married Maggie Hollingshead; Stella who married Leck Parks; Floy who married Lawrence White; Sarah who married Russell (Tony) Hart. Their seventh child was a daughter, Ida.

Dorsey H. Watridge's brother, James Finis, and wife Martha had a son William Henry. William Henry was the father of William H. (Will) Watridge Jr., Champ, James Thomas (Jim Tom) and Eddie. Will Jr. and wife Maude Taylor Watridge were the parents of Lacy, John Dorsey and Everett Watridge.

The following is the eulogy given for Dorsey H. Watridge – Brother deacon Dorsey H. Watridge died in 1890 at his residence of malarial fever. He had professed faith in Jesus and was baptized into the fellowship of the Zion Baptist Church in September of 1854 and was ordained a deacon of the church in May of 1885 and served faithfully. He was a devoted husband and an affectionate father, a true friend, a good neighbor and citizen. Bro. Watridge left his wife and seven children to mourn his loss. (Rev. Josiah Daws was the pastor.)

On February 29, 1900, Jeremiah Fletcher Castellaw (born 1847, died 1915) gave a plot of land west of the church to be used as a cemetery. A copy of the deed is in our possession. It can be found at the Haywood County courthouse in Brownsville, TN, in Deed Book No. 26, page 257.

The following is taken from that deed, which was filed October 29, 1900.


J.F. Castellaw and Wife Deeded to J.B. Booth and the Deacons Holly Grove Baptist Church Filed 29th October, 1900 At 1:00 p.m.

For and in consideration of the sum of one dollar and of the interest we have in the Baptist Church, we, J.F. Castellaw and wife, M.A. Castellaw, have this day bargained and sold, given and granted and hereby transfer and convey unto J.B. Booth, E.B. Bowen, L.A. Williams and J.W. Castellaw, deacons of the Baptist Church of Holly Grove and their successors forever in office, in trust for the use and benefit of the congregation organized into a Baptist Church and worshipping at that place. We are lawfully owners of the said tract and have the right to convey the same and that it is unencumbered and that we will forever warrant and defend the title to said tract of land to the said deacons and their successors. In testimony whereof we have hereunto affixed our hands and seal this 29^{th} day of October, 1900.

M.C. Castellaw J.F. Castellaw

Jeremiah Fletcher Castellaw's parents were Thomas Jefferson Sr. (born 1808, died 1878) and Mary E. Cole Castellaw (born 1809, died 1875). He had two brothers: Thomas Jefferson Jr. and George W, and a sister, Zilpah Elizabeth. He also had three half-brothers: John E., Joseph D., and James W. Jeremiah married Mary Aurelia Blaydes (born 1848, died 1933). She was the daughter of Jessie B. and Lucy Ann Coleman Blaydes. Jeremiah and Mary had nine children: Lucy A., Egbert, Thomas Jefferson (Tom), Jack Coleman, Charles, Arthur, Myrtle, Jelks F., and Jessie B.

On May 4, 1900, J.E. Lott and wife gave a strip of land in front of the church. We have a copy of the deed in our possession. It can be found at the Haywood County courthouse in Brownsville, TN, in Deed Book No. 25, page 565.



BAPTISM IN THE EARLY YEARS

Between the two curves in the road and off to the left stood the home of Hardy and Hattie Cobb. Behind their house was a lake used by Holly Grove Baptist Church to baptize their new converts. Baptism by immersion is an ordinance of Baptist churches. Like Holly Grove, most of the country churches in those years did not have a baptistery. Therefore, baptismal services were conducted on Sunday afternoons at a lake.

Family and church friends would gather on a lake bank and sing, "Shall We Gather at the River," and usually another selection. After a chosen Scripture was read and a prayer was offered, the pastor made his way down into the water. Those who were to be baptized took hands and followed the pastor. One by one, they moved in front of the pastor as he recited the words, "I baptize you my brother (or sister) in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit." The individual was then dipped backwards into the water until they were immersed, portraying the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus.

WILLIAM LEE STYERS, A DEPUTY AND DEACON OF HOLLY GROVE

The following was taken from the Jackson Sun, published July 12, 1926, and given to Martha Herbert Jones by Lee Styers', daughter of Catherine Styers Hollingshead...

"William Lee Styers was born September 19, 1886 and died July 12, 1926. He was married to Mattie Pearl Herbert in 1913.. To this union were born four children, two daughters and two sons. Lee was survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Styers, one sister and five brothers.

Early in life, Lee professed faith in Christ and joined the Baptist Church of which he was an active member. He was a deacon of the Holly Grove Baptist Church and superintendent of Sunday School at the time of his death. Funeral services were conducted by a former pastor, Rev. W.B. Perry, who was assisted by Rev. D.A. Deshazo, the pastor of the Providence Methodist Church. He was laid to rest in the Providence Cemetery..."

In 1926, Lee Styers, along with Haywood County Sheriff E.C. King and former Sheriff Ernie Drake and several other deputies, went out at midnight on a Friday night to find and destroy a whiskey still near the Madison County line. Lee was shot through the abdomen and carried back to his home. His daughter Catherine remembers her father lying on a cot before they carried him to the hospital in Jackson where he died the following Monday. His youngest, Jerline, was only about two years of age, Catherine was eleven, Terrell was nine, and Robert Lee was four.

CHARTER MEMBERS

The following is a brief description of the charter members of Holly Grove Baptist Church.

- 1. J.W. Castellaw (James W. Castellaw, born 1839, died 1918) was married to Rebecca M. Thomas. They were the parents of Sam Castellaw, who was Becky Stewart Booth's great grandfather, so James W. was the great, great grandfather of Becky Stewart Booth.
- 2. J.A. Thomas (John Ambrose Thomas, born 1844, died 1922) was the son of Rev. George E. and Laodicea Rayner Thomas, and a brother to Dr. George Rayner Thomas. John A. married Mary Elisabeth (Bett) Williams. He was the grandfather of Lavern Thomas Styers.
- 3. J.H. Carvin (James Henderson Carvin) married Mary Caldonia White. He had brothers George Bunyon (Bun) and Morgan Moore (Morg). Morgan was James Carvin and Marjorie Carvin Roberts' grandfather, so J.H. was their great uncle.
- 4. Joshua J. Jones (born 1820, died 1896) was the son of John King Jones and wife Sally. He married Nancy Jane Woods. Joshua was a brother to John J. Jones, the great-grandfather of Martha Herbert Jones, so Joshua was her great, great uncle.
- 5. G.W. Castellaw (George W. Castellaw, born 1845) was married to Mary Emily Watridge; they had a son Joseph. When Mary died, George married Mollie E. Watridge. His parents were Thomas Jefferson Castellaw Sr., and his mother's name is unknown. George was the great, great uncle of Billy Castellaw, G.C. Mann and others.
- 6. G.R. Thomas (Dr. George Rayner Thomas, born 1848, died 1922) was married to Mary Frances Booth. He served the Holly Grove, Wellwood and Zion communities as their physician before Dr. F.P. Hess came to the area. G.R.'s parents were Rev. George E. Laodicea Rayner Thomas.
- 7. J.F. Castellaw (Jeremiah Fletcher Castellaw, born 1847, died 1915) married Mary Aurelia Blaydes. They were the parents of nine children, one being Tom Castellaw who married Helen Moody. Tom and Helen were the parents of Grace Powell. J.F. Castellaw gave the property for the Holly Grove cemetery.
- 8. J.B. Booth (James Bembery Booth, born 1848) was the father of Vernon, Jim, Irene and Lela Mai. His first married Elizabeth Ellen Clark, a sister to John T. Clark. At her death, James married her sister Katie Clark. Following Katie's death, he married Eldorator Thomas, the daughter of Frank Thomas. James was a half-brother to Cicero Booth, the grandfather of Milton Booth, so J.B. was a great uncle to Milton Booth, Jean Climer and others.
- 9. J.W. Castellaw Jr. (James William Castellaw Jr., born 1863, died 1918) was the son of James W. Sr. and Rebecca Thomas Castellaw. He was a brother to Sam Castellaw, Becky Stewart Booth's great grandfather; therefore James W. Jr. was Becky's great, great uncle.

- 10. M. White (Media Mathias (M.M.) White, born 1850, died 1886) married Mary E. Booth. They had a daughter, Mandy. When Mary died, he married Laura? He had sisters, Nellie Elizabeth and Rebecca Caroline. Nellie married Sim Cobb. At her death, Sim married Rebecca Caroline White, Nellie's sister. Media's parents were Jacob O. and Martha Ann Elizabeth Nowell White.
- 11. A.C. Booth (Albert Cicero (Roe) Booth, born 1859) was the son of William G. and Eliza Booth. Cicero Booth was first married to Rebecca Manie Williams; they had one daughter, Blanch. His second marriage was to Sally Watridge; they were the parents of four girls and three sons: Albert, Bryant and Dorris. So Cicero Booth was the grandfather of Milton Booth, Jean Climer and others.
- 12. W.E. Williams (William (Will) E. Williams) married Eliza A. Chandler. They were the parents of Blake, Nellie Kate, Lizzie W., Mable L. and Daniel B. Williams. Will's parents were Solomon and Catherine A. Novell Williams. He was the great, great uncle of Alsey (Squatsie) Williams.
- 13. W.P. Outlaw (William Price Outlaw, born 1862, died 1917) married Leanna Catherine Mann. He was Gene Outlaw's great grandfather and Taylor Outlaw's great, great grandfather. W.P.'s parents were Andrew Jackson and Harriet A. Williams Outlaw.
- 14. M.E. Lockard (Moses (Mose) Lockard, born 1859) was the son of G.W. and Lee Lockard.
- 15. B.F. Hughes (Benjamin Franklin (Ben) Hughes) was the son of Jacob and Mary Hughes. He married Mary Abernathy; they had two sons and two daughters, one being Mary Etta Hughes who was Martha Herbert Jones' grandmother. Therefore, Ben was Martha's material great grandfather and the great, great grandfather of Milton Booth, Terry Brown, Betty Brown Doyle, Alan and Lorie Jones and Kathy Simpson Hopper.
- 16. J.G. Livengood (John George Livengood, born 1820, died 1898) was the son of John D. and Sophia Eddinger Livengood. They were Jewish and of the Moravian Christian faith. John G. married Sophia Fouts and they had six children, one being Bryant Livengood, the grandfather of Martha Herbert Jones. Therefore, John was the great grandfather of Martha Jones. He was also the great, great grandfather of Kathy Simpson Hopper, Alan and Lorie Jones, Milton Booth, Terry Brown, Betty Brown Doyle and others.
- 17. Jane W. Jones (Jane Wood Jones) was the wife of Joshua Jones, the brother to John J. Jones, the great, great grandfather of Martha Herbert Jones. Jane Jones was Martha's great, great aunt.
- 18. M.A. Castellaw (Mary Aurelia Blaydes Castellaw, born 1848, died 1933) was the wife of Jeremiah Fletcher Castellaw. They were the grandparents of Grace Powell.

- 19. T.J. Rawls (Thomas Lemuel (Tommy) Rawls, born 1856) His parents were Dr. Joseph W. and Emily Nowell Rawls. Their home was located between Wellwood and Holly Grove. An 1860 census showed Tommy to be four years of age at that time, so he was born in 1856. Other children in the home were William L., John N. and Cena F., who was a twin to Tommy. He married Laura A. Heath, and they had five children: Joseph E., Beulah, William N., Thomas N., and Thomas L. When Laura died, Tommy married Amanda ??.
- 20. Mary C. Carvin (Mary Caldonia White Carvin, born 1859) married James Henderson Carvin. They had no children, but reared six or seven nieces and nephews. Mary's husband was a brother to Morgan Moore Carvin, the grandfather of James Carvin and Marjorie Roberts; therefore, she was their great aunt. Mary's parents were Jacob and Martha A.E. Nowell White.
- 21. M.C. Shaw (Mary Catherine Rawls Shaw) was probably related to Tommy Rawls. She was married to William J. Shaw whose parents were Capt. Neil Kilen and Flora Cameron Shaw. Mary Cartherine and William J. had a son, Tom Shaw, who was the grandfather of June Cobb Childress; so Mary Catherine was June's great grandmother.
- 22. N.M. Castellaw (Nancy Mariana Johnson Castellaw, born 1844, died 1921) was the wife of Thomas Jefferson Castellaw Jr. They were the great grandparents of Billy Castellaw, G.C. Mann and others. Nancy was the lady who gave the property for the Holly Grove School.
- 23. Nettie White (born 1836) An 1890 census showed Nettie to be a widow with three children: Earnest E. (born 1870), Richard C. (born 1873), and Biddie (born 1880).
- 24. M.E. Castellaw (Mary Emily Watridge Castellaw, born 1848, died 1910) was the wife of George W. Castellaw. Her parents were James Finis and Martha Watridge.
- 25. Catharine Booth (Catharine Pearcy Booth) was the wife of Willie K. Booth. They were the parents of daughters: Mary Frances who married Dr. George Thomas, and Willie Katie who married William Edgar Hill. After William's death Willie Kate married John T. Clark, whose first wife Katie Williams had died.
- 26. Lucy A. Castellaw (Lucy Albina Castellaw, born 1867, died 1898) was the oldest child of Jeremiah F. and Mary A. Castellaw. She married Albert Lafayette (A.L.) Cobb in 1887, and was the sister of Tom Castellaw.
- 27. Lizzie Holland She was probably related to Rev. J.B. Holland who served as pastor of Holly Grove Baptist Church from 1928 to 1932. She may have been his mother.
- 28. M.J. Castellaw (Mary Jennie Castellaw, born 1866) was the daughter of Thomas Jefferson Jr. and Nancy Marina Johnson Castellaw. Jennie married James Jacocks and they had four girls and three sons. We believe they built the Christmas house, which was a Sears and Roebuck house.

- 29. Alice E. Castellaw (Alice Evelyn Castellaw, born 1859, died 1917) was the daughter of James W. and Rebecca M. Thomas Castellaw and a sister to Sam Castellaw. She married J.W. Clark and they had a son, Percy Raynor Clark. Alice was Becky Stewart Booth's great, great aunt.
- 30. M.E. Watridge (Mary E. Watridge, born 1844, died 1899) could have been the wife of Dorsey H. Watridge, who gave the property for the Holly Grove Church. If so, she was the great, great aunt of Billy Wayne and Dorsey Watridge and others. (Or M.E. Watridge could have been Mollie E. who married G.W. Castellaw when his first wife died.)
- 31. S.E. Hall No information.
- 32. A.E. Castellaw was possibly Mattie A.E. Coleman (born 1851, died 1886). She was married to John Edward Castellaw. John was the son of Thomas Jefferson Castellaw Sr. whose first wife's name is unknown.
- 33. Reba M. Williams (Rebecca Namie Williams) was the first wife of Cicero Booth. They were the parents of one daughter, Blanch, who married Mays Williamson. Reba was the daughter of Solomon and Catherine Nowell Williams.
- 34. A.P. Stewart (Ada P. Booth Stewart, born 1863, died 1943) married George Luther Stewart (born 1858, died 1927). Her parents were William G. and Eliza Booth. She was a sister to Cicero Booth; therefore the great aunt of Milton Booth, Jean Climer and others.
- 35. Elisabeth Thomas (Mary Elisabeth (Betts) Thomas, born 1844, died 1922) was the wife of John Ambrose Thomas. They were the grandparents of Lavern Styers and Margaret Covington.
- 36. R.C. White (Rebecca Caroline White, born 1852, died 1899) was the sister of Media Mathis White. She married Sim Cobb after his first wife, her sister, Nettie, died. Rebecca's parents were Jacob O. and Martha Nowell White.
- 37. Amanda Williams (Amanda Crowder Williams) married Edward W. Williams. They were the parents of seven children: Mary K., Edward, Henry Foster, Nellie Margaret, Marion, Lemuel E., and Loraine. Henry was the grandfather of Alsey Williams and Marnette Williams Thomas. Therefore, Amanda Williams was the great grandmother of Alsey and Marnette, and the great, great grandmother of Peggy Williams Emison, Jimmy and Bradley Williams, and the great, great grandmother of Stephen Thomas.
- 38. C.E. Williams (Catherine E. Williams (Katie) married William L. Booth. She was the daughter of Solomon Catherine Nowell Williams, and a sister to John Nowell Williams, the father of Zelma Williams Simpson. So she was the great aunt of Leland and Roy Jr. Simpson. Catherine was also a sister to Edward W. Williams, the great grandfather of Alsey Williams and Marnette Williams Thomas, making her their great, great aunt. William L. Booth, Catherine's husband, was a brother to Cicero Booth; therefore, Catherine was the great aunt of Milton Booth, Jean Climer and others.

Brother John G. Livengood's Obituary

Sacred to the memory of Brother John G. Livengood, who was born April 16, 1820, and died March 23, 1898, being 78 years old. Brother Livengood was born in North Carolina and professed faith in the Lord in 1843 and joined the Moravian Church the same year. He lived a consistent member of that church as long as he remained in North Carolina.

He moved to Tennessee in 1871, and was one of the charter members to organize Holly Grove Baptist Church. Brother Livengood had gone to Arkansas to live with his daughter at the time of his death; he had been there only two weeks.

Brother Livengood lived a consistent member of Holly Grove Church until his death. He was a kind and indulgent father, a kind neighbor, and beloved by all who knew of his manly and Christian character.

While the hand of Providence falls heavily upon his family, relations and friends, we humbly bow in submission to Him who doeth all things well and pray God s blessings and comfort to the family and prepare them to meet him where parting will be no more.

Resolved first that Holly Grove Church bow in humble submission to the will of God in removing from us our beloved Brother Livengood. Resolved second that we offer condolence to the stricken family in the loss of their father, believing that our loss is His eternal gain. Resolved further that a copy of these resolutions be furnished the family of the deceased brother, and the same be entered on record in the church record book of Holly Grove Church by order of the Church April 23, 1898.

T.S. Williams Dr. D. R. Thomas

This was copied from an old record found in Alpha Livengood Parker's Bible by her granddaughter, Anne Burnett Crawford. Alpha Livengood was the daughter of John G. Livengood. This obituary is presented to Holly Grove Church by Martha Herbert Jones, daughter of Ida Livengood Herbert. Ida was the granddaughter of John G. Livengood.

PASTORS AND MINISTERS OF MUSIC

From October 1885 to November 2010, Holly Grove Baptist Church has had 44 pastors and 6 interim pastors.

From 1938 to 1956, the pastors of Holly Grove or a member have stepped forward to lead singing. In 1956, the first choir leader was elected. In 1960, the first Minister of Music was called and put on salary, as little as it was. Since that time, Holly Grove has had a Minister of Music, with some them also serving as Minister of Youth.

PASTORS OF HOLLY GROVE CHURCH

The first pastor of Holly Grove Baptist Church that I recall was Bro. W.A. Gardner, who was our pastor from 1938 to 1943. I was only a small child, but in the last year Bro. Gardener was here, I remember they helped him to the pulpit and he sat in a chair to bring the message. Full-time services began while Bro. Gardner here.

Bro. E.B. Bowen followed Bro. Gardner and was pastor for less than a year. He married Elizabeth Mann, sister of Abner Mann. Bro. Bowen became pastor of the First Baptist Church in Bolivar when he left Holly Grove.

Bro. Clayton Baker, a student at Union University and a single young man, became our pastor in the latter part of 1943. He was pastor until 1945 when he finished at Union University. I have many memories of Bro. Baker. Every Sunday night he urged the Juniors to come down to the front to the first two seats in the center section and he led us in choruses like, "I've got the joy, joy, joy, joy down in my heart...." Revivals were always the last week of July, and at the 1945 revival, I, along with about 15 others, made professions of our faith and were baptized by Bro. Baker in Miss Hattie Cobb's lake. Bro. Baker married while at Holly Grove, and his wife Doris became our Sunday School teacher. Our class met for Sunday School in the northeast corner of the one-room church building. I remember on one occasion Bro. Baker came to visit us in his T-model car that was his mode of transportation. He visited around the community on Saturdays. My brother Oneil and I were picking cotton near the house. Bro. Baker always dressed in a blue suit, with a white shirt and a tie. (It may have been the only suit he had.) He told Oneil to get him a sack and - off with that coat and tie - our pastor picked cotton with us. That made quite an impression on us to say the least.

Bro. King Thedford was here for two years, from 1945 to 1947. He and his wife had two little girls. He was also attending Union while he was here.

Bro. Bill Turner came in 1947 and was here until 1949 while he was attending Union University. He and his wife Lucille had a son Hugh. Bro. Turner and his wife worked with the youth and had fellowships for them. Once, they had the youth to come to Union for a visit. The girls stayed with them that night and the boys stayed in one of the dormitories. Bro. Turner led the church in a building program in 1948. Church services were held in the Centerville School on Sundays while a new brick veneer building was constructed on the old foundation. An assembly room, office and 13 classrooms were added at that time.

Bro. L.M. Mayer came in 1950 and served until 1952. He and Mrs. Mayer had no children. He worked at Penney's Department Store while at Holly Grove.

Bro. Roe Neal became pastor in 1952. He and his wife Jane lived in Jackson during the four years he was at Holly Grove. Jane's mother, Mrs. Leona Powell, lived with them and attended church with them. They had one son, A.M. Some members were disturbed when the Bluff Creek Baptist Church for blacks asked Bro. Neal to come and preach to them one Sunday afternoon. Following our services that Sunday, the Neal's, Mrs. Powell and I ate lunch with Leland and Ottie Simpson. When the time came for Bro. Neal to go to the Bluff Creek Church, he asked if we would like to go with him. Jane, Mrs. Powell, Leland, Ottie and I all accompanied him. When we arrived, some members met and welcomed us to their church and seated us up front. Bro. Neal brought God's message to them. Two classrooms, restrooms and a baptistery were added to Holly Grove Church while Bro. Neal was our pastor. He became a chaplain in the Armed Services after he left in 1956.

Bro. Gene White came in 1956. He and his wife Jane had a teenage daughter Gloria and a little son Buster. Another son William Pierce was born to them while they were here. A new parsonage was constructed about half a mile from the church. Bro. White and his family were the first to occupy it. Dewey and I were the first couple to be married in the parsonage, with only the White family, my brother Oneil, Dewey's brother Bobby Jones, and Melvin and Rosa Holcomb present. My sister Ottie Simpson was to stand up with me, but she was in the hospital to give birth to her daughter Kathy (now Hopper), so Rosa was there to fill in for her.

Bro. Bill Davie came to Holly Grove in 1960. He and his wife Jo had three little girls, Linda, age 9, Kathy, age 6, and Marcie, age 3. After leaving, they had a son Billy and another daughter Susie. Linda and Marcie both married Baptist preachers. Billy was the Minister of Music at a church in Memphis for a time. Bro. Davie also served the Big Hatchie Association as VBS director. The churches in Haywood County were part of the Big Hatchie Association before the Haywood County Association was formed. Bro. Davie formed a VBS team of Holly Grove members, consisting of Jo Davie, Martha Jones, Ruth Haak and ??? Edwards. We attended conferences in Nashville at Belmont College and then taught two conferences in the local association.

Bro. Earl Wells came in 1963 with his wife Jo and children Elvin, Mary Joy and Delores. Their oldest son Charles was already married, and Elvin was attending Union. While here, Brother Wells taught school at Westover Grammar School near Jackson. Six more classrooms were added, along with more restrooms, a new kitchen and assembly room. These additions were dedicated June 12, 1966. The sanctuary was remodeled in 1974. Bro. Wells was with us for 10 years.

In 1975, Bro. John Skiles became our pastor. His family consisted of wife Norma and two daughters, Jo and Jennifer. His son was attending Union and working at Penney's Department Store. Their oldest daughter Betty had married just before they came to Holly Grove. Their daughter Jennifer was talented and served as our pianist while they were here.

Bro. Wayne Foropoulos came in 1978 with his wife Beverly and their two little girls Waverly and Melody. Bro. Wayne was only 27 when he became our pastor, but he made a wonderful one. The church grew under his leadership.

In 1981, Bro. Jerry Davis came to Holly Grove after serving in Montana with his wife Lois, daughters Hollie and Kellie, adopted daughter Sally, son Paul and adopted son James. Bro. Jerry was a strong leader and a good pastor. He served here five years before returning to Montana. Holly Grove Church called him again in 1989, and he pastored for another five years. While here the second time, the Family Life Center was completed, with a new office, more restrooms and two other classrooms.

Between the times that Bro. Jerry Davis was here, Bro. Slade Johnson came in 1986 with his wife Peggy and their two little daughters Erin and Ellie. Brother Slade was a wonderful pastor and preacher. We were so blessed to have had him here. During their time with us, their youngest daughter contracted juvenile diabetes, and Bro. Slade left to move the family to St. Louis so they could be near a hospital where their daughter could receive treatment. They had a son after they left Holly Grove. Bro. Slade came back to preach on Loyalty Day one year. He said that he was asked by someone in St. Louis if people further down south didn't have lots of nicknames. He said, "Well, I don't know, but the man who lived next door was called "Rabbit" Lovelace; on down the road was a man named "Squatsie" Williams; then there was "Fatty" Watridge; passed his home was "Sonnyboy" Taylor; and "Bo" Williams lived on nearer the church."

After Bro. Jerry Davis was here the second time, Bro. Mark Mangrum came in 1996, with his wife Angie and son Joshua. His daughter Mary was born just a short time after they came to Holly Grove. Bro. Mark left in 1998 and went to First Baptist Church in Parsons.

Bro. Fred and Nancy Campbell came to Holly Grove in 2000. They had been missionaries in Japan for nearly 13 years. Their family is daughters, Rachel, Carey and Christie, and son Aaron. Rachel lives in East Tennessee with her husband John and their three children. Carey and Tony live in Atwood with their three children, and Tony pastors the First Baptist Church of Atwood. Christie married Tim Fain and they have tree boys. Tim now serves as Minister of Music here at Holly Grove. Aaron went to Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, and is the Minister of Music at Matthew Road in the Dallas/Fort Worth area. He and wife Becky have two daughters. We are so blessed to have Bro. Fred and Nancy with us. He is a great preacher and a loving pastor who really cares about his congregation. Nancy works with the children and is a wonderful musician, serving as organist and sometimes pianist.

God has surely blessed Holly Grove Church with the godly men he has sent our way as pastors through the years. We also remember dear interim pastors like Bro. H.B. Woodward, Bro. John Adams, Bro. John Meadows and Bro. Bob Elliott. Today we are thankful to have on staff Bro. Fred as Pastor, Bro. Ralph Brown as Associate Pastor; Bro. Greg Baker as Minister of Youth, Bro. Tim Fain as Int. Minister of Music, Linda Hayes as Custodian, and the best church secretary. Ann Faulkner.

A TRIBUTE TO THE VETERANS AT HOLLY GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH



Tommy Garstang (born May 27, 1915 in Missouri) enlisted in the U.S. Army at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, in April of 1936. He was later transferred to Hamilton Field, California, where he worked as crew chief on P-36 fighter aircraft. From there, he was transferred to Headquarters Sqdn. 18th Bomb Wing at Hickam Field, Hawaii.

On the morning of December 7, 1941, Tommy was living in the large concrete barracks at Hickam Field. He left his room to go to the mess hall. After hearing a loud noise he looked back and saw smoke coming from his building. It had been hit by a Japanese bomb. Tommy took cover behind a coconut tree and stood there in bewilderment as the Japanese planes seemed to come from every direction, striking and bombing just over the rooftops. At this same time, aerial torpedo bombers were diving and bombing the ships in Pearl Harbor. He saw the bomb hit the battleship "Arizona" and sink it. The explosion almost knocked him down. Shrapnel was falling all around.

Tommy stayed in Hawaii for another year before being sent to the Fiji Islands and then returning to the States. He married Clara Beshears on June 8, 1944 and became stepfather to her three young children. Tommy retired as Master Sergeant October 31, 1958.

Leland Earl Simpson went into the Armed Services in 1942, during World War II, and was sent to Liverpool, England. His regiment later crossed the English Channel into France. They went from there to Germany on a troop train. Soon after, they were sent to the front lines. The atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima at 8:15 on August 6, 1945. Three days later, on August 9, 1945, another was dropped on Nagasaki, Japan. This ended the war. Leland remarked that it saved his life. He married Ottie Herbert in 1950.

Elvis Lynwood (Lynn) Robison (born Dec.1928, died Dec. 2000) entered the Armed Services in 1954. His basic training was at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas. From there he was sent to Fort Carson, Colorado. Lynn was discharged in December 1955. He had married Betty Lewis in April of 1947.

Roy Jr. Simpson, brother of Leland Simpson, was also in the Armed Forces, but he never left the States.

Floyd Dezern (Pete) Stewart was stationed in Germany during World War II. He enlisted in the Army on April 29, 1943, and went into active service in May of that year. Pete's Decorations and Citations were: Good Conduct Medal, World War II Victory Medal, a Bronze Arrowhead, a European African Middle Eastern Ribbon and four Bronze Stars. Some time after being discharged, Pete married Maxine Lovelace, the daughter of Ovid and Olis Lovelace. They attended Holly Grove for several years.

In 1950, The United States draft board interrupted Neil Herbert's musical career for a time. Following his basic training at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, Neil was sent to Germany. While there, he was accepted into special services and became part of an orchestra to entertain the troops. The leader of special services came to him after several months and asked him to form a country western band. They performed in hotels all over Germany and went out on bivouacs to entertain the groups. Neil received his discharge in 1952 and made his home in Memphis. In later years, he married Alma Pugh.

Wiley Thomas Marbury (born 1919, died 1944) lost his life in service to his country in World War II. He was a member of the 121st Infantry Regiment, Gray Bonnet Division of the U.S. Army. The day he died, July 13, 1944, the 1st Batallion of the Gray Bonnets was pulled back to cover Hill 92, while the 2nd and 3rd Batallions moved to the left of them just before nightfall. Sgt. Marbury was 25 years old when he fell victim to enemy machine gun fire in Normandy, France. Shortly after the family was notified of his death, a memorial service was held at Holly Grove. When his body was later returned to the States, additional services were held at the Brownsville Baptist Church. Sgt. Marbury received the Gray Bonnet Pin with a Blue Ribbon.

Aaron Samuel Castellaw (born 1914, died December 30, 1945) joined the Army before the attack on Pearl Harbor and was stationed at Fort Benning, Georgia, where he helped train men for infantry duty prior to being shipped out in January (?) of 1945. Aaron was killed within a month of leaving the States and only four months before the war ended. His remains were sent back to the States to the home of his brother, James Francis. Aaron was buried in the family plot in the Holly Grove cemetery next to his brother, Malcolm R., who also saw action as Sargeant in the Pacific during World War II.

Frank Kemper joined the U.S. Marines in December of 1953 when he was only 17 years of age. His basic training took place in Paris Island, South Carolina. He went from there to Camp LeJune in North Carolina. Frank spent most of his time on a troop carrier as a Sea Radio Operator. He was sent to Puerto Rico where he served until his discharge in December of 1956. We were involved in the Korean War during that time, but it was coming to an end. Later, Frank married Liz??

Bobby Joe Perry (born October 2, 1934) joined the U.S. Air Force June 18, 1953 and was sent to Lackland AFB for basic training. After graduation from training in August of that year, he was reassigned to Charswell AFB in Fort Worth, Texas. On October 10, 1953, Bobby took time out to marry Janie Bernice Qualls. In October of the next year, he was assigned to Elmendorf AFD in Anchorage, Alaska. He also spent time in Blytheville, Arkansas; Columbus, Mississipi and Barksdale AFD Bossier City, Louisiana. He was reassigned to Dahasan AFB in Saudi Arabia in 1967, where he spent a year. Later, Bobby was reassigned to Ubon AFB, in Thailand and was there from June 1971 to July 1972. He was then reassigned to Columbus, Mississippi and Reese AFB in Lubbock, Texas. Bobby retired and moved back to Brownsville, Tennessee in November of 1977. His Decorations were: Good Conduct Medal, Bronze Clasp, 3 Loops; Good Conduct Medal, Bronze Clasp, 2 Loops; Air Force Commendation Medal Outstanding Unit Award, Small Arms Expert Marksmanship Ribbon; National Defense Service Medal (for outstanding unit award) and the Air Force Longevity Service Award Ribbon.

Bob Alexander entered the U.S. Navy in July of 1964. He received his basic training in San Diego, California, and was sent to the Millington Naval Training Facility in Millington, Tennessee, for advanced training. Bob was stationed at Miramar Naval Air Station in California before being assigned to a Combat Cruise on the Carrier U.S.S. Coral Sea for 11 months and then to a Combat Cruise Carrier U.S.S. Ranger for another 11 months. Bob says the large carriers were 1,080 feet long and had 5,200 men aboard. He was discharged in California in 1968 and married Cindy Knott in 1989.

William Louis (Billy) Haak enlisted in the U.S. Marines in 1967. He served his country as Corporal in the Scout Dogs as a radio operator. On July 25, 1969, Billy's life ended as he walked near a demolition pit where three men worked to disarm a mine. The mine exploded, killing the three men in the pit also. His mother, Ruth Haak, was notified by a Chaplain and Captain of the Marine Corps. from Millington, Tennessee. Billy was given a full military funeral on August 9, 1969. He was 20 years old when he.

Charles Lynn Haak entered the U.S. Navy on August 17, 1972, in Jackson, Tennessee. He was stationed stateside in Orlando, Florida, Millington, Tennessee and California before being sent to the South China Sea in Vietnam. Charles was later sent back to California and then to Florida where he was aboard the U.S.S. Saratoga in May Port, Florida, and on Port Smith Naval Ship Yards. In 1990 and 1991, he was a part in Desert Storm/Desert Shield and retired in 1993. His Decorations and Medals were: Bronze Star, National Defense Medal, Sea Service, Southwest Asia Medal, Navy Unit Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Overseas Medal, Good Conduct Medal and the Kuwait Liberation Medal. Charles married Marytean Crutchfield in February of 1993.

GROWTH

THE ORGANIZATION AND GROWTH OF THE NEW CHURCH

The members, who would become the charter members of Holly Grove Baptist Church, met in the log school at Holly Grove to organize the church. Rev. M. Whittle, the pastor of Zion Baptist Church, was the first pastor of Holly Grove. Services were held once a month.

In 1886, Dorsey H. Watridge gave a plot of land for the church building, which as built on the lot in 1892, with James B. Booth as contractor.

In October of 1900, Jeremiah Fletcher Castellaw and his wife Mary gave a plot of land west of the church for a cemetery. Earlier, in February of that year, J.E. Lott had given a strip of land in front of the church.

In 1911, the one-room log church was torn down and a new frame building was built under the supervision of James Jacocks.

In 1920, the first BYPU (Baptist Young People Union) was organized in Haywood County at Holly Grove Baptist Church by Irene Booth Crandell.

In October of 1940, Rev. W.A. Gardner started full time services at the church.

In 1948, the frame church building was torn down and a new brick veneer building was built on the same foundation, with W.N. Cooke and O.T. White supervising the construction. The new building consisted of an assembly room, an office, 13 classrooms and a sanctuary. Rev. Bill J. Turner was the pastor during this time.

In 1953, the first addition to the brick building was made. Two classrooms, restrooms and a baptistery were added. The dedication of this new addition was held November 22, 1953. Pastor A.M. Neal presided, and Rev. Bill J. Turner brought the message.

On July 2, 1957, a one-acre lot was purchased from Dorsey Castellaw for \$9,000 and a brick veneer pastorium was built. A lot of free labor from church members was given. Rev. O.E. White was the first pastor to occupy the pastorium.

In 1966, six classrooms, a kitchen, restrooms and an assembly room were added. Noel Reid and Terrell Styers were the contractors. The dedication was held June 12, 1966. Rev. Earl Wells was pastor.

In April of 1974, the sanctuary was remodeled with Danny Simpson as the contractor. After the completion of a new front for the church and a steeple atop, new furniture and light fixtures, the first service was held at the Wednesday night prayer service on November 13, 1974. A dedication service was held November 24, 1974, with coordinator Dewey Jones presiding and Rev. Bob Elliott, interim pastor, leading the service. Dr. Jonas Stewart gave the dedication message.

In January of 1985, with Danny Simpson as contractor, remodeling and redecorating of the sanctuary took place. Ten more pews were added, the choir loft was enlarged and the baptistery was moved and put in the floor under the pulpit. Rev. Jerry Davis was pastor.

In June of 1988, a ground-breaking for a family life center was held, with Danny Simpson as contractor. In addition to the family life center, offices for the pastor and church secretary, a new kitchen, two restrooms and four classrooms were added. At the dedication, Bro. Slade Johnson delivered the message. Later, a parking garage and storage spaced was added behind the family life center and three more classrooms were added to the space upstairs. Rev. Jerry Davis was the pastor.

In 2000, a new floor was laid in the sanctuary, with John Herron Construction as contractor. Also the baptistery was moved to the back of the choir area, the two upstairs restrooms were enlarged and remodeled, and the building was completely rewired. New light fixtures, new carpet, painting and papering were also done. Rev. Mark Mangrum was pastor.

LORD, THANK YOU FOR OUR HOLLY GROVE MEMORIES

We were at Prayer Meeting in '59 or '60 when Bro. Gene White was our pastor. He had just finished talking about the validity and truth of the Scriptures when he asked Mr. Nemon Cooke, who was a deacon, if he believed that Jonah swallowed a whale. Quickly, Mr. Nemon said, "I sure do." Everyone began to laugh. It seemed a light came on in his head, and he said, "If the Bible said it, I would believe it."

I can remember when our cooling system at Holly Grove was hand-operated with little cardboard fans given to the church by the Brownsville Funeral home. At a business meeting in '63, when Dr. Eldon Byrd was our interim pastor, there had been lots of discussion, pro and con, concerning getting a cooling system for the church. It went on and on. Bro. Byrd said, "Are you going to do it or not?" Someone else said, "I make a motion we do it." Someone else quickly said, "I second it." Bro. Byrd said, "All in favor say aye. The ayes have it."

As a child and going to church at Holly Grove, there were two paths on the southeast side of the building leading down to the ladies' "restroom" and on nearer the road was the men's. I had never though about it, but in talking to Billy Castellaw, he said that those restrooms were put there for the school. It wasn't until the early '50's that a men's and a ladies' restroom were added. But most of us back then were acquainted with that unforgettable outhouse because we had one similar out back at our homes.

Holly Grove Church was before its time with a bus ministry. Albert Booth drove a school bus in the '40's to the Centerville School. He owned the bus, so on Sundays he picked up people all along the road and brought them to church. It was always full, with some even riding the fenders.

A memory that lots of us share was being baptized in Miss Hattie Cobb's lake. The pastor led the way into the water and all those who were candidates for baptism took hands and followed him. Then, one by one, they moved in front of the pastor as he recited the words, "I baptize you my brother (or sister) in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit." The individual was then dipped backwards into the water until they were immersed, portraying the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus.

Some of us can remember the church building as a large, one-room building with an Amen-corner in the southwest corner, but I can't remember it being used for that, for there were few Amen's as I remember back then. For Sunday School, the classes met in different sections of the building, all except the Young People and Intermediate classes. They met in the old Holly Grove School building on the corner. It was left vacant after the Holly Grove, Centerville and Sunny South Schools were consolidated. Mr. Fonville Carr was the janitor of the church and one day, as he was cleaning outside around the church, he started a fire to burn the dry grass. Before he knew it the fire had spread to the old school. It went down quickly.

I was never a member of Holly Grove Church, however my family was. I moved away when I was eight years of age. My dad is buried in Holly Grove cemetery. My sister, Grace Lovelace, was a member until she passed away on September 11, 2010. I am sending a memorial to Grace for your building fund.

Flora Mann McNulty

Back in the early '60's, when Bro. Bill Davie was our pastor, Martha Etta and I were the leaders of the GA's (the Girls' Auxiliary Mission Group) at Holly Grove. We had a large group of girls and were well organized. Some of the girls I remember were Betty Gail Brown, Sara and Kathy Carr, Hilda Borders, Linda Stavely and Mary Elizabeth Truell. Later, Linda Davie and Melinda Norwood were members.

Each year when we took the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, then taken only through the WMU, everyone contributed only about a dollar, so our total reached the sum of about \$30. Bro. Davie encouraged us to make the offering church-wide. We got our husbands involved. Billy Castellaw, with the help of Dewey Jones, took a piece of plywood that Martha Etta had glued to a world map to and bored 30+ holes all over it. He then took two strings of lights and placed them in the holes. Each light turned on for the offering cost \$10. We raised \$300 that year. After changing the different colored lights to different amounts years later, the offering went up to \$5,000! That board was used for many, many years.

Aunt Ottie Simpson helped us with GA's. We had a Mothers and Daughters banquet for the girls, and one year carried them to the Children's Home in Memphis and to the Memphis Zoo.

Another memory from Holly Grove Church for me was when Bro. Gene White was our pastor. Martha Etta and I were in charge of planning the Christmas program. We chose the play, "The Blue Overalls Angel." The play's setting was in a church that was planning a Christmas program. Dewey was the janitor in the play and wore overalls. Billy portrayed a young man, and Gloria White was a young girl. Becky Hight, a seven-yearold child, was one of the main characters. Everyone was amazed at how well she learned her lines and became the little girl in the story. The scene of the play was outside, so we went to Brownsville Funeral Home and borrowed the artificial grass they used to cover graves. We used it to cover the floor and placed a large rock in the center of the stage. Everyone seems to really enjoy "The Blue Overalls Angel."

Another Christmas program we planned and worked on was a live manger scene. It began to snow that Sunday morning while we were at church, and by late afternoon as we were practicing to put it on that night, we began to realize that we would not be able to have our play. We all left to attempt to get to our homes. We had a beautiful white Christmas that year.

Peggy Simpson Castellaw

My mother, Nell Raburn Betts, is 95 and she remembers going to Holly Grove to a revival in 1929. She and her sister, Sue, rode in a buggy from the Providence community, where they lived. When they got there the church was already full and people were standing outside. They stood with Mrs. Mary Fry Williams, Frances Reid and Carlyle's mother. They asked her if she would tell their Daddy that they were outside with them, if he happened to ask. Mother was 14 and Sue was 12.

Carlene Betts Wiltshire

I have many fond memories of Holly Grove. I remember Mr. Everett and Miss Edna Watridge taking me to Sunday School when Mr. Nemon Cooke tried to reach a rowdy bunch of boys about Jesus. I also remember Mrs. Lottie Booth, who gave me my first speaking assignment as our Training Union class spoke before the church on a Sunday evening.

Mr. Albert Booth and Miss Mildred picked me up in their bus and carried me to church during revival, and I always received from Miss Mildred and hug and encouragement when I attended RA's. The women were the leaders before the men took over the boys in RA's. I remember hayrides, and roasting hotdogs and marshmallows. That was a find time back then. There were so who made an impression on me, too many for me to name. Those things helped to shape my life as a young boy.

I remember Miss Grace McGee who came home from church with my mother and me one Sunday. When we sat down to dinner, my step-father said, "We don't say the blessing here, so you can go ahead and eat." Miss Grace said abruptly, "Well, I do," and she began asking a blessing on our food and our home. That made quite an impression on me as a young boy.

It took a few years for me to understand and appreciate the thing I learned in my formative years at Holly Grove. I hope that I have been able to pass on some of those blessings from Holly Grove that have meant so much to my life.

There were three Hight brothers: Romus, Ray and Russell. Our parents were Burr and Mai Hight. I was eight years older than Russell and two years older than Ray. Russell being the youngest was always in our hair. When I as 12 and Ray was 10, we made professions of our faith in Christ at a Holy Grove revival and joined the church.

Our mother was a Baptist and belonged to Holly Grove, and our Daddy was a Methodist at Providence Methodist Church. We lived at Wellwood and it was about the same distance to both churches. At that time, neither church had full-time services so we attended both churches, and I was a member of both Sunday Schools. My Daddy would go to Holly Grove with us, and Mama would go to Providence when we went there.

My parents, Zack and Frances Castellaw, are buried there, as are my grandparents and many other relatives. I always fondly remember Holly Grove with appreciation for its influence on generations of my family.

My best memory of Holly Grove Baptist Church is visiting on weekend and summer vacations. I loved riding the school bus to church, driven by my grandfather, Albert Booth. At Christmas we also rode the bus to deliver fruit baskets we had put together with the help of my grandmother, Mildred Booth. I remember in the early 1950's when Bro. Roe Neal was pastor of Holly Grove. The Lord's Supper was prepared by Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Booth (I always said Uncle Vernon). They used homemade wine. At Bro. Neal's request, we stopped using wine during the serving of the Lord's Supper and began using grape juice. Bro. Neal had a family member who was an alcoholic, and the change was made out of respect for that person and any others who might have been affected by the use of wine.

Danny Simpson

I grew up in Holly Grove Baptist Church, was saved there and baptized in a lake off the Jackson Highway in 1946. My parents, Everett and Edna Watridge, always took us to church. Dorsey Watridge is my brother. We never had a choice to do anything else, if it interfered with church.

Old time memories – My teachers were my relatives like Wilma Sullivan (Big Auntie). The Carters and Watridges were faithful members. W.H. Watridge donated a plot of land to build the first church which was built of logs. Mom and Dad always sat in the seventh pew from the front. Miss Agnes Castellaw shouted one Sunday morning in church and frightened me. The heating system back then was a pot-bellied stove. Airconditioning was – open the windows and use fans donated by the Brownsville Funeral Home. The "Amen Corner" was up front in the corner for the deacons. Bible drills were held in front of the entire church. Women wore dresses and hats to Sunday morning services. Men wore suits and ties, probably the only suit they had. Students from Union University came often to preach at Holly Grove. I was told in the early days that pastors of the church would borrow one of Dad's mules to make visits. They also knew that Mom was a good cook and would have some ham and biscuits and tea cakes to serve up.

I moved away from Holly Grove in 1956, but I feel that I owe my Christian upbringing and having a Christian home today to the older people of Holly Grove.

A good motto for a church, and a feeling shared by Bro. Fred Campbell, the pastor, and Bro. Ralph Brown, the Minister of Music and Youth in '07 and '08 at Holly Grove Baptist Church. As a result of their efforts and others, 85 members were added that church year, a large number of them young people making professions of their faith. Some were family members moving their membership and others were being saved. A second van was purchased by the church and Bro. Ralph and wife Elaine, and others, picked up young people for church. The Baptist and Reflector took notice and wrote about it.

Dr. Charles Pratt, Director of Missions for Haywood and Fayette Counties, informed Holly Grove that the First Baptist Church in Braden had closed its doors due to lack of attendance. He urged the churches in Haywood County to help reopen those church doors for worship. Holly Grove took up the challenge. Bro. Ralph Brown surveyed the area in about a 7-mile radius, and 50 members of Holly Grove visited all the homes on two Saturdays, inviting them to worship at Braden the following Sundays. A preacher was provided each Sunday, and members from Holly Grove met with the church, teaching Sunday School and leading in worship. Then other churches in the Association took up the challenge. The Baptist and Reflector also wrote about this endeavor.

Mr. Robert Barden was recently honored by the Haywood Baptist Association for his 50-year anniversary working in jail ministry in Haywood County. You guessed it - he is a member of Holly Grove. Mr. Robert doesn't like to talk much about it and gives glory to the Lord. He and Bro. Lonnie Robinson go early each Sunday morning to tell jail prisoners about God's grace and the salvation He provides. Mr. Robert has seen more than 2,000 prisoners come to know the Lord. His ministry was written about in the Baptist and Reflector also.

Mr. Dewey Jones, another member of Holly Grove Church, was recently honored by the Haywood Baptist Association for his 40 years of radio ministry. He goes every Sunday morning to the radio station in Brownsville to bring the Sunday School lesson to shut-ins and anyone who is listening.
